

SEWARD PASSENGER DOCK REPLACEMENT

DEVELOPMENT REQUIRES BOND AUTHORIZATION BY LEGISLATURE

SEWARD'S PASSENGER DOCK AND TERMINAL ARE CRITICAL INFRASTRUCTURE FOR ALASKA'S VISITOR INDUSTRY. Owned and operated by the Alaska Railroad Corporation (ARRC), these aging facilities are at the end of their useful lives and cannot continue to support Seward's cruise visitors without replacement.

ARRC has received a proposal for a new passenger dock and terminal facility at a purchase price of \$137 million. The requested \$75 million in bond authorization would be additive to the \$60 million authorized in 2022, with ARRC making an equity investment in the project as well. Securing the additional bond authorization this session is critical to meeting our timeline of completing the new dock and terminal in time for the 2026 cruise season.

- Bonds issued by ARRC are not a liability of the state, and no state dollars will be used for repayment.
- ARRC bonds will be secured by a long-term use agreement with Royal Caribbean Group.
- The existing passenger dock is near the end of its useful life; replacement is necessary to maintain Seward as cruise port.
- A new dock and terminal facility will support the next 50 years of visitor demand.
